## **The Hummingbird Collection**

A pack of native plants with tubular flowers that attract hummingbirds and support native pollinators. Beebalm, Blazing Star, and Cardinal Flower are featured.

- Cardinal Flower Lobelia cardinalis
  - Light: Full sun to partial shade
  - o Soil: Wet to medium-wet
  - Bloom Time: July to September
  - Host For 5 different butterfly and moth species
  - Attracts butterflies
  - The ruby-throated hummingbird frequents this flower
- Scarlet Beebalm Monarda didyma
  - Light: Full sun to partial shade
  - Soil: Medium-wet to medium-dry
  - Bloom Time: June to August
  - Host For 11 different butterfly and moth species
  - Attracts bumble bees and specialist bees
- Blazing Star Liatris spicata
  - o Light: Full sun to partial shade
  - o Soil: Wet to medium-wet to medium
  - Bloom Time: July to September
  - Host For 2 different butterfly and moth species
  - Important nectar source for butterflies

## **The Woodland Pack**

With inspiration from Ohio forests, The Woodland Pack presents 3 native Ohio species, with emphasis on shade tolerance and butterfly/moth hosts. Spicebush, Wild Columbine, and Waxy Meadow Rue are featured. All three species thrive in shade, so even the darkest corners of your garden can be filled with biodiversity.

- Spicebush Lindera benzoin
  - Light: Partial to full shade
  - o Soil: Rich, moist to wet soils, or dry to average soil
  - Bloom Time: March to April
  - Host For 12 different butterfly and moth species, including:
    - Spicebush swallowtail
    - Eastern Tiger swallowtail
    - Promethea silkmoth
    - Imperial Moth
  - Pollinated by small bees and flies

- Waxy Meadow-Rue Thalictrum revolutum
  - Light: Partial sun to shade
  - Soil: Dry to moist
  - Bloom Time: May to August
  - Host For 14 different butterfly and moth species
  - Although wind-pollinated, bees and beetles collect the pollen as an important protein source
- Red Columbine Aquilegia canadensis
  - o Light: Full sun to full shade
  - Soil: Medium to medium-dry to dry
  - Bloom Time: April to June
  - Host For 11 different butterfly and moth species
  - Favored by hummingbirds and bumble bees

## **Pollinator Bonanza**

This collection of three native species provides support for pollinators during all stages of development. Swamp Milkweed, Mountain Mint, and Blue False Indigo are featured.

- Blue False Indigo Baptisia australis
  - Light: Full sun to partial shade
  - Soil: Medium-wet to medium
  - Bloom Time: May to July
  - Host For 17 different butterfly and moth species, including:
    - Clouded Sulphur
    - Polyphemus moth
    - Io moth
    - Wild Indigo Duskywing
    - Orange Sulphur
  - Bees are specially suited for pollinating the flowers
  - Provides nectar for a variety of butterflies
- Blunt Mountain Mint Pycnanthemum muticum
  - Light: Full sun to partial shade
  - Soil: Medium to medium-dry
  - Bloom Time: July to September
  - Host For 5 different butterfly and moth species
  - A party of bees, flies, and skipper butterflies are attracted to the small flowers
- Swamp Milkweed Asclepias incarnata
  - Light: Full sun to partial shade
  - Soil: Wet to medium-wet to medium

- o Bloom Time: June to August
- o Host For 12 different butterfly and moth species, including:
  - Monarch
  - Isabella Tiger Moth (wooly bear caterpillar)
  - Cecropia silkmoth
- All different pollinators visit this plant, from native bees and hummingbird moths to monarch butterflies
